AAUW of Maine Fall Gathering – October 21, 2006 ALL MEMBERS INVITED

On October 21, 2006, we will be gathering at the University of Maine at Orono for the Fall Leadership Team meeting and an exciting afternoon session on the Maine WAGE Project and the wage groups movement. All members of AAUW are welcome to join us for both the afternoon session as well as the board meeting in the morning. We will meet in the Totman's Lounge in the Memorial Union from 9-12 for the board meeting, break for lunch on our own in the Marketplace, and our afternoon WAGE Project workshop from 1-3:30 p.m.

The WAGE Project, Inc. (www.wageproject.org) is a 501(c)3 charitable, tax-deductible organization established for one purpose: to end discrimination against women in the American workplace in the near future. To do that, WAGE inspires and helps working women to take the steps needed so that every woman is paid what she's worth.

The WAGE Project is the means by which women go from earning \$0.77 for every \$1 men earn to earning as much as men. The nickname, WAGE, reminds us of the goal we pursue: Women Are Getting Even. WAGE is led by Evelyn F. Murphy, author of *Getting Even: Why Women Don't Get Paid Like Men and What To Do About It*. Dr. Murphy is a Ph.D. economist, former Lt. Governor of Massachusetts, and board member for various corporations and non-profit organizations.

Thanks to the Portland YWCA, Maine was the first state to form wage groups as part of the Wage Project Movement. The Maine Wage Project, a coalition of various statewide groups, was founded by Anne Houle. There are currently over 20 active wage groups in Maine, including one at Colby College associated with the Waterville AAUW branch. We will be learning more about the wage gap and how we as an organization can get involved. Emphasis will be on how to form a wage group in your own community to get women talking about the wage gap and how to close it.

During the afternoon, we will also explore the fantastic AAUW website via PowerPoint display. It has a wealth of information about women's issues for members and branch leaders alike. More information about the 2007 Convention will also be available at the site. So, be the first to be "in the know!"

So, plan on gathering with us on October 21 and kick off the AAUW year! This is also AAUW's 125th anniversary so we will celebrate some accomplishments during the day

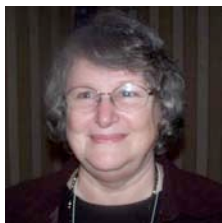

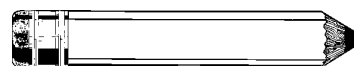
This upcoming year is full of plans and promise for AAUW of Maine. The leadership team continues to work on our AAUW goals and strategies.

EF/LAF News

Nancy Hutchinson, State EF/LAF Chair



The Basket Raffle at our State Convention in May was very successful. Each branch contributed a uniquely-themed filled basket which added further color and interest to a great convention. It resulted in contributions to the Educational Foundation (EF) and the Legal

Advocacy Fund (LAF) totaling \$852, which was given in memory of Past President Lucinda (Cindy) Hebert. Many thanks to all branches and contributors!

Your support is paying off locally. Two recipients of EF grant awards have attended the University of Maine of late. Becky Woodward, a PhD candidate in mechanical engineering at the University of Maine, was an EF Fellowship grant recipient during 2005-2006, as was Heather Short, a PhD candidate in geology at the University. Our congratulations go to both of them.

AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund is 25 years old and has been involved in over 100 cases of alleged discrimination in higher education. LAF has awarded over \$1 million towards those cases over that time. In a recent update, LAF announced two victories in two LAF-supported cases. In *Miller v. Texas Tech*, a jury decided in favor of Lucinda Miller and Elaine King-Miller in their fight against denial of tenure and retaliation for complaints about discrimination. In *deMartin v. New Mexico Highlands University*, the university made a settlement offer upon hearing that LAF had chosen to support deMartin's case for sex discrimination in pay, race discrimination, and retaliation for her complaints of sex discrimination which resulted in wrongful termination.

LAF is supporting plaintiffs in two Title IX cases against UC Davis. Former wrestling coach Michael Burch is suing UCD over his dismissal in May, 2001. He alleges he was fired due to his public support for a group of female wrestlers who were cut from the team in October of 2000. Four female wrestlers have filed suit alleging they were denied the opportunity to wrestle because of their gender. ACHIEVEMENT CITATION AWARD 2006

To All of the Branch Presidents:

Remember all those nominations for the Achievement Citation Award that you had every intention of submitting last year? Why not get an early start this year and actually do it in 2006 before the **January 31, 2007 deadline** is looming?

The basic requirements include:

- The nominee should be a woman in Maine who has made a distinctive contribution in some AAUW field of interest or study (service to state, to education, to arts, or to humanity, for example).
- The nominee should have a valid connection with the state.
- The nominee should exhibit achievement over and above job-related activities.
- The nominee should be a "pioneer" in her area.

Additional considerations include:

- The nominee does **not** have to be a member of AAUW and does **not** have to be an "unsung" heroine.
- The achievement does **not** have to be employment related.
- Other qualifications may be non-traditional fields and significant contribution to community/region/state, women's issues, or a particular field.



Making a Difference the AAUW Way!

easy for us to get involved, make our opinions known, and influence outcomes.

Most of us joined AAUW because we want to join with like-minded women to affect the policies that shape society and protect the hard-earned progress others earned for us. We

understand that education continues to be the key to success. Education has opened doors to career possibilities that, even a few years ago, would have been considered completely out of the realm of what was possible. Today we enjoy benefits won by that activism and courage of women before us. However, we know those rights are not secure. Critical issues such as educational equity, retirement security, a fair and balanced judiciary, civil rights, workplace equity, reproductive rights, healthcare reform, and equal pay are at stake each time we go to the ballot box.

So what can you do?

- **Inform yourself** – check AAUW’s website and learn about national issues. For local issues check out www.MaineWomen.org -- that’s the Maine Women’s Policy Center and Maine Women’s Lobby. Their site has research and issue papers giving the facts on issues you care about.
- **Get involved** – write letters to the editor, talk with friends, work in your branch and community on important issues. If you can, attend meetings, ask questions, and offer your opinions. For example, this year the Breakfast of Champions is a gubernatorial candidate forum – that’s a great place to learn more. Finally, there are always volunteer opportunities – for example the Maine Women’s Lobby is looking for help in the fight to defeat the Taxpayer Bill of Rights citizen initiative on November’s ballot. And don’t worry about your skill level – they need all of us and, believe me, there is a job for you!
- **Register for and use the Action Network on the AAUW website.** I know I sound like a broken record on this subject, but it’s important. Being an activist is easy and you send an important message that you care.
- **Register to vote – then vote!** Encourage others to register and vote. You can even register online. Teens and the twenty- to thirty-age group of women are particularly underrepresented when it comes to registering and voting. Talk with them.

On November 28, AAUW will be 125 years old. That’s 125 years of member activism on behalf of women and girls. Much has been accomplished, but we have so much more to do. Because equity **IS** still an issue!

**AAUW OF MAINE'S STATE PROJECT:
WOMEN'S PATHWAYS TO
EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE**

If you care about education in Maine and about women's equity, please read on. On Saturday, Feb. 3, 2007 (snow date of Feb. 10, 2007), AAUW of Maine will hold a major and significant conference, *Women's Pathways to Educational Leadership*, for Maine women educators. As is typical throughout the country, relative to their numbers as teachers in grades K-12, Maine women are under-represented as educational leaders.

The *Pathways* conference is designed as a day to motivate women leaders to step up to leadership and to offer them the tools to do this. Not one person invited to participate as a panelist, speaker, or workshop leader has declined our invitation, which testifies to the appreciation and support of this issue that exists among Maine's educational leaders. An outstanding roster of presenters has been developed.

The day will begin with a keynote speech from Maine Commissioner of Education Susan Gendron. A panel of Maine educational leaders that includes superintendent, a principal, and a curriculum coordinator, then will discuss their very interesting pathways to leadership. During the last session of the morning, participants will hear about leadership aspirations.

During lunch, educational leaders will be seated at each table to guide discussions about leadership and support for leadership. After lunch, five workshops will be offered: (1) career mapping, (2) strategic orchestration of job searches, (3) interviewing and negotiating a contract, (4) finding a mentor, and (5) balancing personal and professional life. During the last session of the day, participants will hold a roundtable discussion on ways to put to work what they have learned about stepping up to leadership.

This inspirational day will be held at Colby College and hosted by AAUW of Maine. We will need 12 AAUW of
